How culture influences children's development

Children also start to create their own “cultures” by about nine months and before the age of five the need for, and organization of, adult and peer cooperation radically change. 9,10,11 Early in development, children are incapable of regulating the social organization of their interaction, but as middle childhood approaches, greater autonomy of child groups becomes possible.

Similar to the views of Csikszentmihalyi and Feldman, in our complex dynamic systems model of creativity, the environment is not an outside force that stands in the way of children’s inborn creativity, but an intrinsic part of creative development: Creativity emerges through continuous interactions between the child and his or her close environment.

Lev Vygotsky (1896 -1934) was a Soviet psychologist who researched children’s learning in social and cultural contexts. In particular, his theory of ‘social constructivism’ discussed the importance of social interactions in children’s cognitive development.
